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About this manual

Purpose

The purpose of this reference manual is to provide the descriptions, procedures and detailed parameter explanations required to allow for safe and efficient use of the Kongsberg MDM 500, as well as a thorough understanding of the system parameters and adjustments.

A good understanding of system functions and controls is essential to fully take advantage of the functionality provided. Sea conditions vary, sometimes drastically, and it is not possible to identify settings that will provide the best data at all times. Careful study of the information in this manual is highly recommended, preferably while exploring the system's functionality.

System description

The Kongsberg MDM 500 Marine Data Management system is a Windows-based utility for storage and distribution of the data recorded by the various sensors normally found on oceanographic research vessels.

These sensors may include instruments such as:

- navigation systems
- weather sensors
- sound propagation sensors
- hydrographic instruments

The MDM 500 collects data from these sensors, and stores the data in a relational database. All sensors are physically connected to the MDM 500 system through dedicated Client computers ore are accessible over the LAN. Each Client computer offers the necessary software drivers to accept and decode the information provided by the sensors. You can use any number of Client computers on your MDM 500 system. You can also connect any number of sensors to each Client computer, this is only limited by the interface capabilities on each computer.

Data may also be distributed to other instruments or computers on board. Each Client computers offers a remote output. You can add any number of Client Monitor computers to the network to supervise the data traffic.

Example 1 Data distribution

The exact time received from the GPS system may be distributed to all personal computers on the network, as well as all to other instruments that need time data.

Position data from the GPS may be distributed to any system on sensor that need geographic information.


By means of the MDM 500 applications and tools provided, you may select which sensor to log data from. For each sensor you can define logging parameters, such as the sampling rate.


All data from sensors without their own logging facility are recorded. From sensors with their own logging facility, usually only a reduced data set is recorded.

The MDM 500 provides a selection of either alphanumerical or graphical data for on-line monitoring. Reports based on the data stored in the database can be generated, either as standard reports or custom reports via an open database connectivity (ODBC) protocol interface.

System diagram

A simplified system diagram is provided.





A This is the Client computer.

Any number of Client computers may be used in a MDM 500 system. Any number of peripheral sensors may be connected to each Client computer by means of serial or Ethernet lines. Each Client computer runs the MDM 500 Client Manager software, as well as any tool applications that are required. The Client Manager software also provides the necessary drivers to accept and decode the information from the sensors.

B This is the Client Monitor computer.

Any number of Client Monitor computers may be used in a MDM 500 system. No sensors are connected to this computer. The MDM 500 Client Manager software allows you to monitor the information provided by any sensor connected to the network.

C This is the MDM 500 Server computer.

Only one Server computer is used in the MDM 500 system. he Server computer runs the MDM 500 Server Manager software, as well as any tool applications that are required. The Server computer also provides the database application supported by the necessary data storage hardware.

Normally, no sensors are connected to this computer. However, it is possible to install the Client Manager software on the Server computer, and thus allow this computer to have two roles in the system. The relevant sensors are then connected directly to the Server computer.

D This is an external sensor.

Any number of external sensors can be connected to the Client computer by means of serial or Ethernet lines. The number of sensors is only limited by the interface capabilities on the Client computer. Several different sensor types may be connected to collect navigation, weather, sound propagation or hydrographic data.

Hardware

The design philosophy for the MDM 500 is to use standard high-end personal computers both for the MDM 500 main server, spare server and MDM 500 client computers.

All MDM 500 software will run under any personal computer with the Windows 7 operating system.

All data equipment belonging to the MDM 500 system, including the hubs must be connected to a uninterrupted power supply.

Interchangeability

The hardware can be upgraded with parts approved by Kongsberg Maritime without changing any MDM 500 software.

New sensors and/or instruments are added by installing a new driver on the relevant Client computer. All interface configuration is done on the Client computer, while other logging parameters are defined on the Server computer.

Software

The following software applications, modules and drivers are implemented:

1 MDM 500 Server Manager

This is the main software application on the MDM 500 Server computer. It provides a relational database management system for storing sensor data and reduced data sets from single- and multibeam echo sounders. It also controls the data recording and distribution, as well as the overall system performance. A Display Driver module allows the software to communicate with you.

2 MDM 500 Tools

A set of tool applications is available for dedicated purposes.

- SVP Editor
- SVP Manager (no longer used, replaced by SVP Editor)
- Report Manager
- Watchdog
- **3** MDM 500 Client Manager

This is the main software application that runs on the Client and Client Monitor computers. The Client Manager holds all the Sensor Drivers to render possible the data inputs from the peripheral sensors and instruments. It also provides an Output Data Formatter to distribute the sensor data on the internal MDM 500 format. A Display Driver module allows the software to communicate with you.

The Output Data Formatter also provides an auxiliary data output to the network.

For use on a Client Monitor computer, the Client Manager includes a Input Data Decoder module. This module will convert the sensor data from the internal MDM 500 format to formats fitted for supervision.

The MDM 500 Client Manager can be started in different modes:

- Normal mode: this is the mode described in this manual.
- Floating mode: in this mode you can show more than six sensor forms simultaneously, and they can be moved freely around the screen.

Floating mode is started by adding the parameter –floating when starting the Client Manager.

• Debug mode: this is a special mode used for debugging. In this mode a log file mdm.log is created in the folder MDM 500 under %AppData%

Note _

The log file is not deleted automatically and can become very large. Do not use Debug mode for normal operation, it is provided for investigation of problems.

Debug mode is started by adding the parameter –debug when starting the Client Manager.

System configuration

An MDM 500 system runs on one or several Windows 7 computers connected to a local area network. One of the computers is configured as a server. On this computer, the MDM 500 Server Manager is installed. The database is also usually installed on this machine. The MDM 500 Server Manager stores data received from the Client computer(s), and distribute the data to the Client Monitor computer(s).

On all the other computers on the network, the Client Manager software is installed.

The Watchdog tool is installed on a computer other than the one running the Server Manager. This tool monitors the operational status of the Server Manager.

Operational principles

The MDM 500 Marine Data Management system consists of several separate applications and modules that used on a number of networked computers.

The "heart" of the system is the Server Computer with the Server Manager software and the database. All MDM 500 operation is controlled from this Server Manager, and all logged data – as well as configuration data – are stored in this database.

Data flow

Data from each individual sensor are connected to the Client computer(s). The Client Manager on each Client computer uses a Sensor Driver, which allows you to define the communication parameters. The individual Sensor Drivers are predefined to interpret certain data formats, such as NMEA serial line transmissions, and common or proprietary telegrams. The following Sensor Drivers are currently described in this manual:



The data collected from the sensor(s) are formatted by the Output Data Formatter module to conform to the internal MDM 500 data format.

The Output Data Formatter also provides a auxiliary data output to the Ethernet. Data is then exported to other programs via the open database connectivity (ODBC) protocol.





The data collected by the Client computer(s) are distributed to the Client Monitor computer(s) and the Server computer.

The Server Computer controls these operations by means of the Logging & Distribution module. The Server Manager uses the Database Controller module to place all the collected data in the database, and – when requested – read it back for secondary distribution. The System Setup module allows you to define the operational parameters, and control the overall operation.

The Client Monitor computer(s) uses the Input Data Decoder module to convert the internal MDM 500 data format to a format suitable for display.

Data storage

On the Client computer(s), the Sensor Drivers issue each sensor with a unique identification. The data collected from the sensor are formatted as telegrams. Each telegram is provided with a unique number, and it is tagged with the time of reception. Every data item stored in the database is then provided with a unique item identification. All data collected by the MDM 500 system are thus identified with:

- Time
- Sensor identification
- Telegram
- Data item identification (information field in the telegram)

By assigning such unique identifications to each and every data item recorded, it is possible to store, recall, distribute and process only the specific data you are interested in. This will effectively reduce the amount of data that are stored, and at the same time increase the accuracy of the information.

The Database Controller in the Server Manager software controls all data storage. It is possible to control which data items to store, and how often these shall be stored.

Since all data are time-tagged by the Sensor Drivers in the Client Manager, you may extract data from any number of sensors for a given period of time.

Network security

Equipment manufactured by Kongsberg Maritime are frequently connected to the ship's local area network. Connecting any computer to a network will always expose the data on that computer to all other computers connected to the network. Several threats may immediately occur:

- Remote computers can read the data.
- Remote computers can change the data.
- Remote computers can change the behaviour of the computer, for example by installing unwanted software.

Usually, two parameters are used to define the threat level:

- The likelihood that any remote connection will do any of the above.
- The damage done if a remote connection succeeds doing this.

Because Kongsberg Maritime has no information regarding the complete system installation on any vessel, we can not estimate the threat level and the need for network security. For this reason, we can not accept responsibility for network security. Systems provided by Kongsberg Maritime are regarded as stand-alone systems, even though they may be connected to a network for sensor interfaces and/or data distribution.

Important

No safety applications are installed on any Kongsberg Maritime computers to protect these against viruses, malware or unintentional access from external users.

Securing the MDM 500 itself has no meaning unless there is a policy in place that secures all computers in the network, including physical access by trained and trusted users. This must always be a task for the customer to implement.

If you wish to connect the MDM 500 to the ship's network, you must implement the same security mechanisms on the MDM 500 computer(s) as for the rest of the network. In the tentative standard from Det Norske Veritas (DNV) - *Integrated Software Dependent System (DNV-OS-D203)* – this is described as a task for the network responsible person in charge of the overall behaviour of the network system. Some key elements here must be:

- The same anti-virus protection on all computers, including routines for updating this protection.
- The same settings for the firewall on all computers.
- Controlled physical access to computers on the network.
- Trusted operators.
- Log-in access mechanisms
- Same policy for attaching peripheral equipment to the computers (USB devices, hard drives etc)
- Installation of programs on any computer in the network, verification that each program is authentic.
- Definition of which programs are allowed to run on each computer.
- Logging mechanism of computer activity, and inspection of these logs.

How to define and implement these rules depends on each end user's network system configuration, which again must be a result of the policies and threat levels the end user has defined for the complete installation. For some products the network consists of only processor units or work stations, transceivers and a few sensors. On other vessels, larger computer systems can be installed to include numerous products and data systems. As the DNV-OS-D203 suggests, there must be one responsible person for the security of a system, large or small.

Scope of supply

A typical Kongsberg MDM 500 Marine Data Management will comprise the following items:

- 1 Software dongle
- 2 DVD with database software
- 3 CD with MDM 500 software

Optionally, the following items may be provided:

1 Server computer

Typically, a Hydrographic Work Station (HWS) computer is provided. Keyboard and mouse is included.

2 Client computer(s)

Typically, a Hydrographic Work Station (HWS) computer is provided. Keyboard and mouse is included.

3 Colour display(s)

System familiarization

Even though the MDM 500 Marine Data Management system may be implemented with numerous Client and/or Client Monitor computers, the Server computer with the Server Manager software is the heart of the system.

The Server computer is set up as an HTTP server. This means that you can access the Server computer from any other computer on the network by means of a standard web browser. This HTTP access is used when you wish to install the Client Manager software – and Tools – on any Client or Client Monitor computer.

All operation of the various applications conform to standard procedures for Windows[®] software. It is assumed that you are familiar with normal operation of Windows[®] software, and with standard web browsers and similar programs.

Note

The name of the Server computer is vital for access to the HTTP server.

Power on/off procedures

How to power up the MDM 500

Purpose

This procedure explains how to power up the Kongsberg MDM 500 system.

Note ____

The MDM 500 system runs on standard commercial computers. In a typical operational environment, these may not have been supplied by Kongsberg Maritime.

- 1 Verify that the peripheral sensors are all operational, and that they are connected to the Client computer(s).
- 2 Power up the Server and Client computer(s) as described in the relevant computer manuals.
- 3 Allow the operating systems to start, and log in as a system user.

Unless your system administrator has made other arrangements, the standard log-on credentials are:

- User name: operator
- Password: simrad1
- 4 Start the relevant applications from the operating systems **Start** button, or click the icons on the desktop.

How to power off the MDM 500

Purpose

This procedure explains how to power off the Kongsberg MDM 500.

Note _

The MDM 500 computers will normally be kept permanently operational, especially during a survey. On most vessels, the system is only powered down when the ship is berthed.

- 1 Close down the applications using the relevant **Exit** commands.
- 2 Power down the computer(s) using the functionality provided by the operating system.

How to perform basic operations

How to start the MDM 500 applications

All MDM 500 applications are started like any other Windows[®] programs. As a minimum requirement for operation, the Server Manager and Client Manager must be operational with one or more active sensors.

Note _

On the Server computer, the Server Manager and Watchdog applications will start automatically once you log on.

- 1 Click the Start button in the bottom left corner of the desktop.
- 2 Click All programs.
- 3 Locate the MDM 500 group.

- 4 Click to start the relevant application:
 - Server Manager
 - Client Manager
 - SVP Manager
 - Watchdog
 - Report Manager

Tip _

The same programs may also be started from the desktop or the task bar if the relevant short-cut icons have been created.



The table provides one row for each sensor connected to the system. The row identifies the sensor by its name, and the number of received and stored telegrams. Each row is thus dynamic, and you can use this information to verify that you are in fact receiving data from the various sensors.

boxes to choose how much data you wish to include in the report.

All allows you to include all the data recorded from within the chosen time span, while the other options will reduce the amount of data in your report.

Note _

Consider the type of data before you choose to include mean values in your report. For example, mean depth values make sense, while mean positions do not.

6 Click one of the four report- and query buttons to generate the report based on the parameters you have entered.

Observe that the report is provided in the Report Manager's host application. For further functionality (including print and export), observe the toolbar.

MDM 500 Tools

Several auxiliary applications are available. These are generally referred to as "Tools". The following tools are available:

The tools can be installed on any computer in the MDM 500 system.

Introduction to SVP Manager

The SVP Manager is a tool for receiving and distributing sound velocity profile (SVP) and conductivity, temperature and depth (CTD) data. It can receive these data from various sensors over a serial line, a network line, or from a file. Data can also be converted and distributed on various formats over the local network to remote recipients.

Provided that the **Enable Storing** function is enabled in the **Configure SVP Manager** dialog, the data is automatically stored in the MDM 500 database once it is imported from the sensor.

Note

The SVP Manager has been replaced by SVP Editor from release 2.0 of MDM 500. The SVP Manager is still included but may be removed in future releases.

Introduction to Report Manager

The Report Manager allows you to run queries and print reports based on the stored data. You are also permitted to edit sensor names for the reports.

By means of the Report Manager it is easy to view the data recorded from any given sensor, from any two sensors combined, or from the Cruise Recorder. The data can be printed using the built-in report template, or you can create your own layout. The data can also be copied and pasted into other applications, such as office text editors and spreadsheets.

Introduction to Watchdog

The Watchdog application monitors the status of the Server Manager and the Client Manager with the Sensor Drivers. It will provide you with a warning if there is anything wrong with the MDM 500 system.

You can install the Watchdog on any computer in the in the MDM 500 system, and it may run on several computers simultaneously. Since the MDM 500 system is designed to operate without any user interventions, you may choose to install the Watchdog application on computers that are being monitored more frequently.

A standard report provides the actual recorded data in a tabular format. Each row in the table contains the information from one record with columns for time stamp, field name and value. You can generate these reports using the **Run Query** and **Preview Report** buttons in the applicable dialogs.

- The **Run Query** option outputs the report for on-screen view. This format can easily be exported to a suitable file format using the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.
- The **Preview Report** option outputs the report for printed output, and provides additional information in a report header. To start the printing, use the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.

Cross tab reports

Cross tabulation is the process of creating a contingency table from the multivariate frequency distribution of statistical variables.

In statistics, a contingency table (also referred to as cross tabulation or cross tab) is a type of table in a matrix format that displays the (multivariate) frequency distribution of the variables. It is often used to record and analyze the relation between two or more categorical variables.

The **Run Cross Tab Query** and **Preview Cross Tab Report** buttons in the Report Manager dialogs allow you to output the sensor data in a contingency table.

In this table format, information that are common in multiple related records are grouped. You can generate these reports using the **Run Cross Tab Query** and **Preview Cross Tab Report** buttons in the applicable dialogs.

- The **Run Cross Tab Query** option outputs the report for on-screen view. This format can easily be exported to a suitable file format using the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.
- The **Preview Cross Tab Report** option outputs the report for printed output, and provides additional information in the report header. To start the printing, use the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.

5 Set up the logging parameters using the functionality provided.

1 Field

This column identifies the sensor, selected telegram, and the information provided by the telegram.

2 ID

This column identifies the sensor, the selected telegram, and the information using the sensor identification number.

 \rightarrow Driver, sensor and data field identification numbers on page 179

3 Master

This parameter allows the settings identified for the relevant sensor (data item) to be used for the other sensors in the same group. The following options are available:

- **a True**: The relevant sensor (data item) is set up as Master to share its data recording parameters (Sampling and Interval). In order to inherit these settings, the **Sampling** parameter for the other sensors must be set to *Slave*.
- **b** False: The relevant sensor will not share any parameters.

Only one of the sensor connected to any given group can be set up as Master. The status for all the other sensors in the same group will then automatically be set to *False*.

Note _

The information provided by the Master data item will always be logged first. The other data items will then be logged in the order they appear in the group. For this reason, we recommend that the Master data item is placed at the top of each group.

4 Sampling

This parameter controls how much of the data provided by the sensor that are saved to the database. The following options are available:

a All

All data telegrams received from the sensor are saved to the database.

b MSeconds

Only the telegrams received every given millisecond will be stored. The interval (number of milliseconds between each capture) is controlled by the **Interval** parameter.

c Sample

Only every "x" telegram are saved, for example every fifth. The interval is controlled by the **Interval** parameter.

d Slave

The **Sampling** and **Interval** parameters are inherited from the sensor (data item) currently set up as Master.

5 Interval

This parameter controls interval between each saved data telegram. The parameter field is only activated when **Sampling** is set to *MSeconds* or *Sample*. You are then permitted to enter any valid integer.

Example 4 Sample and Interval settings

If you only wish to save the telegrams provided every second, set **Sampling** to *MSeconds* and **Interval** to *1000*.

If you only wish to save every tenth telegram, set **Sampling** to *Sample* and **Interval** to 10.

The following columns are provided:

1 ItemID

This column provides the unique identification provided to each data item (part of a telegram) from a sensor.

This function allows you to search through the records in the database. Since this **Search** function is located <u>inside</u> the table, it allows you to search for information within the data currently provided in the table. Click in the search field, write the phrase, and then push **Enter**.

How to change logging group organisation on recorded data

The **Data Values** dialog allows you to retrieve, examine and modify data recorded by a defined sensor. The dialog allows you to click through the currently selected sensors, and provide all relevant information related to:

- Recorded data for each individual data item (part of telegram)
- Group belonging

You can also use this dialog to change the sensor group organisation on previously recorded data. This organisation is initially defined in the **View Configuration** dialog in the Server Manager application. However, when you later generate reports, you may find that this organization was somewhat unfortunate. The **Data Values** dialog then allows you to change this.

Note _

The changes you make to the sensor group organization using the **Data Values** dialog are permanent. If you wish to change back to the original configuration, you must do so manually using this procedure one more time.

If you have many sensors, you may use the **Record** or **Search** functions at the bottom of the dialog.

How to delete data from the database

This procedure explains how to delete data from the database.

The data you delete from the database using the **Delete Data** dialog are permanently removed, unless you have previously made a backup with the data. This dialog must thus be used with extreme care.

You are only permitted to use a start data and an end date to select the data to be deleted. Both dates are inclusive. The recorded information from all sensors within the defined time period will be removed. You are not able to delete information for specific sensors.

Note

Make sure that you have made the necessary backup copies before you delete data from the database!

Sound velocity profile procedures

The SVP Manager is a tool for receiving and distributing sound velocity profile (SVP) and conductivity, temperature and depth (CTD) data. It can receive these data from various sensors over a serial line, a network line, or from a file. Data can also be converted and distributed on various formats over the local network to remote recipients.

Provided that the **Enable Storing** function is enabled in the **Configure SVP Manager** dialog, the data is automatically stored in the MDM 500 database once it is imported from the sensor.

Note _

The SVP Manager has been replaced by SVP Editor from release 2.0 of MDM 500. The SVP Manager is still included but may be removed in future releases.





How to restore the operating system

Purpose

Each computer provided by Kongsberg Maritime is equipped with a system restore DVD. This DVD can be used to restore the computer hard disk in case of serious errors or hard disk replacements.

Note _

This procedure will delete all data on your hard disk. Use this procedure only for emergency restore.

Procedure

- 1 Insert the Windows[®] 7 DVD.
- 2 Re-boot the computer.
- 3 When prompted, press any key on the keyboard to boot from the DVD or USB disk.

- 4 When the first installation screen appears, press **Enter**.
- 5 On the second installation screen, select **Repair Computer**.
- 6 In the System Recovery Options window that appears, click Restore your computer using a system image ... and click Next.
- 7 Accept the defaults in the Re-image your computer window dialog, and click Next
- 8 Follow the on-screen instructions to complete the restore operation.

How to troubleshoot the device driver software

The device drivers in the MDM 500 system have been designed using all the information available. However, since the physical products from third party manufacturers are not always available to the developers during software testing, there may be ambiguities in the communication formats from the equipment and in the documentation at hand.

To provide the correct data format, two applications are made available, *SerialLogger* and *UDPLogger*. These applications will log the actual data flow from the sensor to a file that can be sent to Kongsberg Maritime to help correct the device driver software.

- 1 Insert the CD with the MDM 500 software into the DVD player.
- 2 Use any file manager application provided to locate the readme.txt file located on the CD.
- **3** Open the readme.txt to find additional information.
- 4 Open a command prompt, and use DOS commands to move to the relevant folder on the CD.
- 5 To collect data from a serial line, run this command from the command prompt:

SerialLogger 2,9600,8,0,1

Replace the communication parameters as required

6 To collect data from a network interface, run this command from the command prompt:

UDPLogger 10003

Replace the UDP port as required

7 Collect the log files, and send them to Kongsberg Maritime.

Network setup

On most computers delivered from Kongsberg Maritime there are more than one local area network connection provided. Only one network connection is enabled, the others are disabled.

If additional network connections are required, they must first be enabled in the operating system.

Computers delivered from Kongsberg Maritime have been assigned static Internet Protocol 4 (IP4) addresses, not Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP). This has been done to make sure that the delivered system will work in a stand-alone environment. Read chapter *Network Security* in the MDM 500 end user manuals <u>before</u> attaching the computers to your local area network.

Tip _

If the access to the MDM 500 database is lost after changing the network address, it is most likely because the Open Database Connectivity (ODBC) connection has changed.

In Windows[®] 7, The ODBC connection can be verified using the following application:

C:\Windows\SysWOW64\odbcad32.exe.

On the System DSN tab, check entry MDM4.

The file C:\Windows\System32\drivers\etc\hosts has been edited by Kongsberg Maritime to allow the use of logical names rather than IP4 addresses when communicating with other MDM 500 computers. If the IP4 addresses are later changed, for example by allowing DHCP to set the addresses automatically, these entries must be removed.

Changing the network setup requires that the MDM 500 system must be tested afterwards. When there is a connection between the Server and the Client computers, and data from the sensors are stored in the database, the setup has been completed successfully.



Description

The **Server Manager** is the main dialog in the Sever Manager application. All other Client and Client Manager computers – with input from peripheral sensors – are controlled from this application.

The Server Manager provides the following features:

- Start/Stop Logging: Logging is controlled with a single on/off button.
- View Configuration: A dedicated dialog can be opened to view the configuration.
- Clients and Datagrams: A list providing all network items and their data is provided.
- Messages: A message field is used to provide messages related to the logging.

Parameters

1 Start Logging

This is an on/off switch provided to start or stop the logging activity. The text in the button reflects the current mode. When logging is started or stopped, a message related to this is presented in the Message field.

This button opens the **KSGPL Export** dialog where you can export data to Kongsberg SIS Graphical Programming Language (KSGPL).

4 Clients and Datagrams

The rows in the Network items table identifies each connected sensor.

The table provides one row for each sensor connected to the system. The row identifies the sensor by its name, and the number of received and stored telegrams. Each row is thus dynamic, and you can use this information to verify that you are in fact receiving data from the various sensors.

If data flow from a sensor stops, and a time-out occurs, the background colour of the applicable field changes to red.

5 Remember logging for next session

Description

The View Configuration dialog controls the entire logging operation.

The left side of the dialog contains a list of all the peripheral sensors currently interfaced to the MDM 500 system. For each sensor, you can expand the structure to see the telegram formats supported and the fields in each telegram.

The right side of the dialog provides you with four logging groups.

By means of the functionality provided, you can place any sensor data in any logging group, and control how often the data shall be recorded.

Parameters

1 Sensors and telegrams

This list reflects the current availability of sensors. Click on the small triangles to open (and close) the tree structure. The supported telegram formats are listed under each sensor.

2 Add

Click once on a telegram format, the click this button to add the selected telegram to the respective group. The same telegram format can be connected to many groups simultaneously.

3 Remove

Click once on a telegram format in the logical group, the click this button to remove the format from the group.

4 Clear

This button will remove all the telegrams in the group.

5 Groups

You can organize the data in four logging groups. These are identified as Group 1 through Group 4. The logging groups are used by the Report Manager, and allows you to create reports with only a selected number of sensors in each group.

You can change the group configuration in the Report Manager configuration.

Groups

The data recorded by the MDM 500 can be organized in four logging groups. By means of the **View Configuration** dialog, you can control which sensor data (telegrams) that is saved in each group, and the interval of the samples.

These groups are later used during reporting, as a dedicated report allows you to retrieve information from a group of sensors. By means of such logging groups, you may collect the information from related sensors.

1 Field

3 Master

Description

Each of these six rectangles correspond to the six forms available in the Client Manager dialog. If you have more than six sensors connected to the Client computer, you must choose which to see. You can also use a second Client computer and connect maximum six sensors to each of them.

2 Available Sensors

The list at the bottom of the dialog shows the available sensors connected to the Client computer. The list is populated automatically depending on your software license. Next to each sensors in the list is a symbol showing the status of the sensor:

- Green: The driver is activated and is trying to log data.
- Red: The driver is not activated.

- 1 To add a sensor to one of the data forms, click on the sensor name in the list, and drag it into the form you wish to use. You can also double-click on a sensor name, the relevant sensor will then automatically occupy a vacant form.
- 2 To remove a sensor from one of the data forms: click on it.

Generic Configuration

The Generic Configuration dialog is opened when you click the Config button in the Generic Sensor form in the Client Manager dialog.

Purpose

The Generic Configuration dialog allows you to define custom interfaces for your own sensors.

Description

The Generic Configuration dialog is typically used when you need to define a new sensor for interface with the MDM 500, and you are not able to get one from Kongsberg. The various parameters provided by the dialog will allow you to set up an interface to most sensors, but in order to do this efficiently, it is assumed that you have some prior experience with telegram formats.

The generic driver permits you to decode text sentences that are either formatted as a delimiter (e.g. comma delimited such as NMEA) or fixed width delimited. The data can be sent to the driver either as an network (UDP) telegram or as a serial telegram.

The telegram structure is specified by the following features:

- A telegram header is optional. If you specify one, the generic driver will verify that the sentence contains the specified header at the given offset. If not, the sentence will be discarded. If you are defining a delimited sentence, you must place the delimiter after the header.
- Each telegram normally contains one or more fields. These are labelled data items in the MDM 500 software. The fields can be separated by a delimiter, or they may have a fixed width.
- The end of telegram is identified by a termination character. One or more termination characters can be selected (including one arbitrary character). Once a termination character is found in the sentence, no further decoding will be done.
- The specific fields (data items) are entered into a table. All fields that are specified will be decoded and passed on to the MDM 500. Also, all these fields will automatically be shown in the Generic sensor form in the Client Manager dialog.

- If the telegram sentence is delimited, you must only specify an index. If the telegram has a fixed width, you must enter the start offset and the field length. The start offset is number of characters from the beginning of sentence.
- All fields (data items) are decoded as text strings, so they may contain spaces, decimal points, special characters just as these are presented in the input string from the sensor.

Generic Configuration: Data Source

Parameters

1 UDP datagram

Click to specify that the telegram you wish to receive is retrieved from a network interface.

A header offset must be used if the telegram sentence starts with a timestamp or counter, and this information is provided before the telegram's header.

Example 9 Creating an telegram interface (data structure)

You wish to log telegram format \$GPGLL,5215.84,N,00707.05,W,183406.00,A.

This telegram has a header (SGPGLL), and each field uses a comma as a delimiter. Six fields are used, and no specific end characters are defined in the format.

In the Data Structure tab, you must first defined the header, then click to select Delimited, and choose "comma" as delimiter. Finally, since no end character is defined, click to select "*", "CR" (carriage return) and "LF" (line feed) as termination characters.

You wish to log telegram format \$GPGLL, 5215.84, N, 00707.05, W, 183406.00, A.

This telegram has a header (\$GPGLL), and each field uses a comma as a delimiter. Six fields are used, and no specific end characters are defined in the format.

In the Fields tab you must then define the following fields:

The three fields providing "N", "W" and "A" are only denominations, and you do not need to save these.

Indexes 1, 3 and 5 are used because the fields to be kept are the first, the third and the fifth after the header.

Example 11 Creating an telegram interface (fixed width fields)

If your fields have fixed widths, you must fill in the following columns in the **Fields** tab:

The phrase "offset" is used because a fixed length telegram normally does not contain any delimiter characters. Offsets 1, 3 and 5 are used because the character fields to be kept starts with the first, the third and the seventh after the header. The field lengths provided are the number of characters in each field. Note that the field lengths must correspond to the offsets.

Serial Port Setup

The **Serial Port Setup** dialog box is opened from the **Serial** button in the Client Manager. There is one **Serial** button for each Sensor Driver that supports serial interface.

Purpose

The Serial Port Setup dialog box allows you to define the parameters for serial communication with external sensors (measuring devices) or peripheral systems.

Description

Serial ports are still a very common method for interface between maritime systems.

It is very important that any serial line between the MDM 500 and any external system is setup up correctly with identical parameters at each end.

The NMEA^[1] standard for serial communication defines standard parameters for such interfaces.







2 Auto Enable

Check this to automatically enable storing of file information in the database.

3 Database settings

These parameters control the database used by the SVP Manager to store the sound velocity profile information.

- **a Enable Storing**: Check this box to enable or disable storing of file information in the database. This should be enabled by default.
- **b DSN** (Data Source Name): This parameter is used to display which database to use. Default name is mdm4. Do not change this unless you have a non-standard MDM 500 installation.
- **c** Login: If required, enter your user name to log into the MDM 500 database. Unless modified by the system administrator, the default user name is user1.
- **d Password**: Enter your password. Unless modified by the system administrator, the default password is [blank].

4 Thin Profiles

Check this box to reduce the number of depth/sound velocity elements in the converted profile. The amount of "thinning" is controlled by the Max SV Rate Cng parameter value. A larger number produces less points in the profile.

5 Max SV Rate Cng

Use this parameter to define maximum change between two neighbouring values in the profile. If the change is larger than the value entered, it will be deleted.

6 Extend to

Select a depth from the list to automatically extend the profile to the selected depth. The hydrographic multibeam echo sounders provided by Kongsberg Maritime can measured down to 12.000 meters, but no sound velocity profilers can measure this deep. This function uses a fixed equation to add depth/sound velocity elements to the selected depth.

Report Manager application

The Report Manager allows you to run queries and print reports based on the stored data. You are also permitted to edit sensor names for the reports.

By means of the Report Manager it is easy to view the data recorded from any given sensor, from any two sensors combined, or from the Cruise Recorder. The data can be printed using the built-in report template, or you can create your own layout. The data can also be copied and pasted into other applications, such as office text editors and spreadsheets.

Note _

When the Report Manager is started, it is contained in a host application. The functions offered by this host program (Print, Print Preview, Zoom etc.) are used, but considered familiar to most users. For this reason, they are only briefly described in this manual.

The Report Manager application provided with the MDM 500 system allows you to create numerous report types. All these reports are based on queries made in the Report Manager dialogs, and the reports can be provided on different formats.

Standard reports

A standard report provides the actual recorded data in a tabular format. Each row in the table contains the information from one record with columns for time stamp, field name and value. You can generate these reports using the **Run Query** and **Preview Report** buttons in the applicable dialogs.

- The **Run Query** option outputs the report for on-screen view. This format can easily be exported to a suitable file format using the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.
- The **Preview Report** option outputs the report for printed output, and provides additional information in a report header. To start the printing, use the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.

Cross tab reports

The **Run Cross Tab Query** and **Preview Cross Tab Report** buttons in the Report Manager dialogs allow you to output the sensor data in a contingency table.

In this table format, information that are common in multiple related records are grouped. You can generate these reports using the **Run Cross Tab Query** and **Preview Cross Tab Report** buttons in the applicable dialogs.

- The **Run Cross Tab Query** option outputs the report for on-screen view. This format can easily be exported to a suitable file format using the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.
- The **Preview Cross Tab Report** option outputs the report for printed output, and provides additional information in the report header. To start the printing, use the functionality in the Report Manager's host application.

Host application functionality

The Report Manager is started in a host application designed by Microsoft[®]. This host application provides some important functionality in a dedicated tool bar.

1 Password



There are also four options available for report generation.

- The Queries & Reports option allows you to create reports based on data from a single sensor.
- The Queries & Reports 2 option allows you to create reports based on data from two separate sensors.
- The **Group Queries** option allows you to created reports based on the four logical groups you defined when you set up the Server Manager application.
- The All Selected Values option allows you to created a report containing all the data in the database.

Parameters

1 From Date

This field allows you to enter the start date of the recorded data you wish to include in the report. Enter the date on the format defined in your operating system setup.

The date entered is inclusive, so all data recorded on the defined date will be included in the report.

2 To Date

This field allows you to enter the end date of the recorded data you wish to include in the report. Enter the date on the format defined in your operating system setup.

The date entered is inclusive, so all data recorded on the defined date will be included in the report.

- • ×

3 Instruments

This parameter allows you to choose which sensor your report shall include data from.

The list of available sensors is generated automatically based on the sensor registered in the database on the Server computer.

In this dialog, you are only permitted to retrieve data from one single sensor. If you need to create a report based on two sensors, you must use the **Query & Report** 2 dialog.

4 Telegrams

This parameter allows you to choose which of the chosen sensor's telegram you wish to include data from.

5 Dataitem

Once the sensor (instrument) and telegram has been chosen, this list reflects the various information contained in the telegram.

Click on the data item(s) you wish to include in the report. To select more than one item, hold the shift or control key, and click several items. If no data items are selected, an error message will be provided when you try to generate the report.

Example 13 The relation between Instrument, Telegram, and Data Items

If you select a Depth sounder instrument (sensor), one telegram option is the **DBT** NMEA telegram. The data items (fields) offered by the **DBT** telegram are Depth from sounder, Depth from surface, Depth from keel, Depth and Offset. This telegram format thus provides five individual data items.

6 Sample Rate

You can choose if you wish to include all the chosen telegram(s) from the selected sensor, or if you wish to reduce the amount of data in the report.

- All: Include all recorded data
- Every minute: Include only data from every minute. If the database holds data that are collected more frequent than this, the Report Manager will calculate the mean value of all these.
- Every nth minute: Enter the sample value as an integer in the text field. If the database holds data that are collected more frequent than the chosen sample rate, the Report Manager will calculate the mean value of all these.
- Every nth hour: Enter the sample value as an integer in the text field. If the database holds data that are collected more frequent than the chosen sample rate, the Report Manager will calculate the mean value of all these.

Note _

Consider the type of data before you choose to include mean values in your report. For example, mean depth values make sense, while mean positions do not.

About the NMEA telegram format

The Kongsberg MDM 500 can send and receive information to and from several different peripherals. All transmissions take place as **telegrams** with data sentences. Each telegram has a defined format and length.

The NMEA 0183 standard is the most common protocol used to receive and transmit data to and from peripheral sensors. A parametric sentence structure is used for all NMEA data. The sentence start with a "\$" delimiter, and represent the majority of approved sentences defined by the standard. This sentence structure, with delimited and defined data files, is the preferred method for conveying information.

National Marine Electronics Association (NMEA)

The *National Marine Electronics Association (NMEA)* has defined communication standards for maritime electronic equipment, and the MDM 500 echo sounder conforms to these standards. The most common standard is *NMEA 0183*, and the National Marine Electronics Association describes it as follows:

The NMEA 0183 Interface Standard defines electrical signal requirements, data transmission protocol and time, and specific sentence formats for a 4800 baud serial data bus. Each bus may have only one talker but many listeners.

NMEA telegram principles

To move information between two electronic units, the data are collected in **telegrams**. The content (protocol) of each telegram is defined by the NMEA standard, and several telegram types exist to allow different type of data to be distributed.

The phrase datagram is also frequently used about this communication method.

Unless you wish to write your own software, you do not need to know how these telegrams are designed. However, whenever you set up equipment interfaces, you need to ensure that each system on your communication line is set up to send and receive the same telegram. The standard allows one system to send data (a "talker") and several

others to receive data simultaneously ("listeners") on the same line. Therefore, you must ensure that all products receiving data on a communication line is set up to receive the same telegram(s) that the transmitting product provides.

Standard NMEA 0183 communication parameters

The communication parameters defined for NMEA 0183 are:

- Baudrate: 4800 bits per second
- Data bits: 8
- Parity: None
- Stop bits: One

Some instruments will also offer other parameters and/or choices.

NMEA sentence structure

The following provides a summary explanation of the approved parametric sentence structure.

\$aaccc,c-c*hh<CR><LF>

- 1 "\$": Start of sentence (Hex: 24).
- 2 **aaccc**: *Address field*. The first two characters (**aa**) identifies the *Talker ID*, while the last three characters are the *Sentence formatter* mnemonic code identifying the data type and the string format of the successive fields.
- **3** ",": *Field delimiter* (Hex: 2C). This character starts each field except the address and checksum fields. If it is followed by a null field, it is all that remains to indicate no data in the field.
- 4 c—c: *Data sentence block*. This is a series of data fields containing all the data to be transmitted. The data field sentence is fixed and identified by the *Sentence formatter* in the address field. Data fields may be of variable lengths, and they are preceded by the *Field delimiter*.
- 5 *"*"*: *Checksum delimiter* (Hex: 2A). This delimiter follows the last field of the sentence, and indicates that the following two alphanumerical characters contain the checksum.
- 6 hh: Checksum
- 7 <CR><LF>: Terminates sentence
